## From our Chaplain

First Sunday of Advent

Dear Friends,

a famous play is being produced in Sydney at the moment called "Waiting for Godot" by Samuel Beckett and the reviews are just excellent. It is a difficult play to perform (and maybe to sit through) as we watch two tramps on a bare stage sit under a tree waiting for someone called Godot to turn up - but he never does. It is a rather absurd situation yet this production manages to bring out the humour imbedded in the text by its Irish author.

Godot may not even be a person, but is meant to stand for the meaningless passing of time when nothing much seems to happen, where the characters don't change or develop because they are waiting for someone else to come along and fix up everything that is wrong with them. The play is a critique of people who miss out on life, who spend their time aimlessly conversing and playing games to pass the time away while waiting for something or someone else to rescue them.

Every year we are reminded that Advent is a time of waiting, of expectation that the promises made in Scripture will be fulfilled and that it will be very soon. How soon depends very much on our preparedness to change, to let go the trivia of our lives and begin to cooperate with the full plan and purpose intended for us by our Creator. Augustine's Advent was very much longer than four weeks as he admits in his Confessions: "Here I was already thirty, and still mucking about in the same mire in a state of indecision" (6.11.18). For the first half of his life he was like the two tramps sitting under a tree incapable of taking responsibility for his own life.

It was only when he read St. Paul's Letter to the Romans: "Put on the Lord Jesus Christ and make no provision for the flesh to gratify its desires" (13, 13) that he stopped 'waiting for Godot' - humanities' perennial excuse for doing nothing - and surrendered to the divine overture made by God to enter into our history and our personal lives like a thief in the night. Advent is a time to be alert, to re-awaken in our lives the meaning that Christ gives to our existence, who breaks into the innermost room of our house, not to rob us of anything but to share with us his life, his courage, his love.

We Christians greet the world in all its absurdities and overwhelming tragedies from the perspective that God is with us, He has come and has never left us: "Wherever you go on earth, however long you remain, the Lord is close to you. So don't worry about anything. The Lord is always nearby". (Sermon 171,5)
